**Dear Elias Family and Friends,**

Welcome to the Fall Harvest edition of the Elias Communicator! Sowing and reaping are some of the most dynamic principles expressed in the Bible. We are drawn to the idea by the popular verse from Galatians 6:7-10: “Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh; but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest-time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all, and especially for those of the family of

faith.”

The results from sowing and reaping ripple far beyond the agricultural concepts of planting and harvesting. There are financial gains that we make when we invest in a property or something of value. Our thoughts and emotions may also become the fertile soil for our seeds, as it is written in Proverbs 3:2 “From the fruit of his lips a man will enjoy good things, but the desire of the faithless is violence.” What are you seeding with your lips? Are you seeding what you’re needing, such as health and prosperity? Or does your soul need weeding . . . of anxiety and worry? Are you sowing good health by confessing that Jesus restores your youth like the eagle and causes you to soar? Are you sowing prosperity by proclaiming that He is your wonderful Shepherd who provides all that you need before you even ask? One thing is for sure, we absolutely eat of the fruit of our thoughts and words that we speak - good or bad.

Now taking this into a deeper perspective, what are we sowing into other’s lives? For instance, Proverbs 13:22 says, “A good man leaves an inheritance to his children’s children, but the sinner’s wealth is passed to the righteous. Obviously, this refers to something much greater than financial wealth; our true inheritance is the *fish* (instructive wisdom) we give to our children, spouse or friends, that lasts a lifetime and beyond, in their continual spiritual and emotional development. What we are sowing now becomes our eternal legacy. You may also seed into the life of others by passing on a skill or ideas or principles – Bible verses are always of the greatest value!

On a broader scale, God commands us to invest our gifts and talents into the kingdom, serving each other in the holy church. Yes, we give of our money, but also of our time, our devotion, our faith. Even though there has been recent disruption regarding the ELCA’s declarations and memorials, it doesn’t change the Lord’s plan that we continue to sow and reap the harvest for God through our Elias church ministries.

## From The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther



From Luther's Commentary on Galatians. (Note that the entire Galatians commentary can be read online! See references below each quote.)

Galatians 6, verse 7. *"For whatever a man soweth, that shall he also reap."*

These passages are all meant to benefit us ministers. I must say I do not find much pleasure in explaining these verses. I am made to appear as if I am speaking for my own benefit. If a minister preaches on money, he is likely to be accused of covetousness. Still people must be told these things that they may know their duty over against their pastors. Our Savior says: "Eating and drinking such things as they give; for the laborer is worthy of his hire." (Luke 10:7.) And Paul says elsewhere: "Do ye not know that they which minister about holy things live of the things of the temple? and they which wait at the altar are partakers with the altar? Even so hath the Lord ordained, that they which preach the gospel should live of the gospel." (I Cor. 9:13, 14.)

Galatians 6, verse 8. *"For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap everlasting life."*

This simile of sowing and reaping also refers to the proper support of ministers. "He that soweth to the Spirit," i.e., he that honors the ministers of God is doing a spiritual thing and will reap everlasting life. "He that soweth to the flesh," i.e., he that has nothing left for the ministers of God, but only thinks of himself, that person will reap of the flesh corruption, not only in this life but also in the life to come. The Apostle wants to stir up his readers to be generous to their pastors.

That the ministers of the Church need support any man with common sense can see. Though this support is something physical the Apostle does not hesitate to call it sowing to the Spirit. When people scrape up everything they can lay their hands on and keep everything for themselves the Apostle calls it a sowing to the flesh. He pronounces those who sow to the Spirit blessed for this life and the life to come, while those who sow to the flesh are accursed now and forever.

The Apostle intends soon to close his Epistle and therefore repeats once more the general exhortation unto good deeds. He means to say, "Let us do good not only to the ministers of the Gospel, but to everybody, and let us do it without weariness." It is easy enough to do good once or twice, but to keep on doing good without getting disgusted with the ingratitude of those whom we have benefited, that is not so easy. Therefore, the Apostle does not only admonish us to do good, but to do good untiringly. For our encouragement he adds the promise: "For in due season we shall reap, if we faint not." "Wait for the harvest and then you will reap the reward of your sowing to the Spirit. Think of that when you do good and the ingratitude of men will not stop you from doing good." <http://www.gutenberg.org/files/1549/1549-h/1549-h.htm#link2HCH0006>

## What's in the "Library?" More than you thought!

The best way to find a book in our library is to browse, choose, and grab one that appeals to you. The broader your scope for choosing, the more likely that something will appeal to your tastes. Just browse over the general titles; your curiosity or your experience will help you make a selection. Many of our books have short chapters or segments that require a brief reading with Bible references and simple examples of problems faced by the general Christian reader. General teaching volumes include: **To the Kid in the Pew, 60 Chapel Talks**. Eldon Weishett dedicated his book to his 16 year-old son on his birthday, saying he appreciated the joy the book has brought into his life. His goal is to use generally well-known examples for the listeners of very short sermons that carry a message in everyday life. A "Fact-Talk" provides a valuable, easily-grasped lesson. These are suitable for "kids" of all ages.

For very little children the brevity of teaching time and direct issues send important messages throughout **A Young Child's Garden of Christian Virtues**. Susan Lawrence focuses on 100 good rules for growing with Bible verses, a brief poem, activities and a simple prayer for each. Every member of the family can participate in bringing small children to responsible Christian growth.

For special concentration, Ralph G. Turnbull offers 21 Communion Meditations in, **At the Lord's Table**. When we receive Communion our minds can be pulled many directions; how many values do we gain in concentrating on the meaning of each aspect of the benefits of receiving the sacrament?

Some biographies contain familiar names and give a feeling for the differences that impact all our lives. In a different country with the native people we learn of some exceedingly troublesome circumstances that make it truly difficult to understand *actual* circumstances. The books by Corrie Ten Boom (with C.C. Carlson) certainly lift us out of our regular circumstances into a foreign world. We have heard about it, but can't imagine living in it. Maybe our modern lives hold more *like* circumstances than we really want to contemplate. In **My Father's House**, Corrie recalls the years before **The Hiding Place**.

It is not often that we find the work of a local author. The amazing story of Specialist 5, John C. Bennett, has the excitement of the war from the view of a Christian guided by his strong beliefs. He explains as best he can the problems he has had, with only the usual treatment methods that often just don't help. In a sentence late in the book **Killed in Action—Struck by Lighting; A Vietnam Combat Medic's Story**, he summarizes the author's essential philosophy that "God is in control of Earth's future, present and past." Having been placed in a body bag and living to tell the story became an incredible adventure of survival.

These are some of the types of books that we offer in Elias' Library.

“It is the way of God to give riches to a man [or woman] so that he/she may assist the needy and perform the commandments. If a man [or woman] does not act thus and begets pride through his/her riches, they shall be punished, as it is written: ‘Riches kept by the owner there of is to their own hurt.” P. 293, *The Talmudic Anthology*, 1966.

## **A Thoughtful Writing:** by Austin Purdue, from **The Single Eye**

“Our Lord tells us that life is a matter of the focus of the lenses of the heart and mind on the right thoughts and actions. Time and again he repeats this point in different ways . . . . And what we believe in our hearts we must have first concentrated upon with our minds, thoughts, and imaginations. This is a simple teaching, isn’t it?” Perhaps our difficulty is that it is almost too simple. We can’t believe that most of the bad fruits that we produce with our lives are the direct results of the bad seeds we have consciously or unconsciously planted through thoughts and attitudes. It is difficult for people to see and believe this, for they insist on blaming their bad fruits on other people’s faults or rotten breaks. Even the most scholarly will often fail to examine the seeds planted in their hearts to account for the tragedies that happen in their lives. This is why Jesus warned of the tragedy of spiritual blindness -- John 9:41 “If you were blind,” Jesus replied, “you would not be guilty of sin. But since you claim you can see, your guilt remains.”, for there is little hope for the man who refuses to look at his own life with honesty.” **Illuminations of the Synoptic Gospels, Anthology.** p.68. Leila Whitney Galbraith. 1989
