## **Growing with the Times**

A Change to the Elias Altar Flower Program

In previous years, the Elias congregation has generously donated week after week to fill the altar flower vases. At \$35 per week, it was a reasonable cost for live flowers, but as with most things, a change was needed. Beginning in January of 2024, we will be starting a more modern version of the flower program that is both more financially friendly and easier on those who staff the church.



Instead of Elias having a standing order with the florist for every Sunday, anyone wishing to donate live flowers for a specific service will call the florist and make arrangements directly with the florist. After that, a brief email or phone call to Deb Zimmerman in the church office will ensure that the appropriate dedication is placed in the weekly bulletin. It will be a requirement that all arrangements and dedications will be made at a minimum of two Wednesdays prior to the service in question.

To prevent confusion, a sign with instructions and the florist's contact information will be placed in the back window of the church, where the previous binder for flower signups was located. Whoever chooses to donate real flowers is expected to take the flowers with them, or dispose of them, at the end of the service for which they were donated. During services for which no previous arrangements have been made, the seasonal faux floral arrangements provided by the Women of the ELCA will be used.

Some may ask why it was necessary to make this change. There were three main reasons that provided the catalyst for the new program. First, over the years the cost of nice floral arrangements has increased drastically, and while the florist has been quite kind in maintaining the price of \$35 per week, the quality of the arrangements has significantly decreased. Second, as the congregation size has dwindled, so too has the ability to provide flowers for all the needed services. It simply is not reasonable to continue to ask the congregation, or the ladies, to continue to foot the bill for 47+ services a year, especially if we wish to increase the quality of the arrangements. The final reason, and quite frankly one with a significant weight, is the stress it puts on an already limited staff. The need for someone to constantly monitor who put what in the book, whether the florist delivered or if they delivered when they shouldn't have, did the donor take the flowers, etc., is all labor-intensive and exhausting. Getting volunteers to take over programs previously managed by others has proven impossible, and thus a change must be made.

Many churches already have made this change, as it is more environmentally friendly and reduces costs overall. The change was brought to the Congregation Council and approved, and so Elias grows into a new phase of altar maintenance!

Once again we are preparing to celebrate the birth of Jesus, with Mary riding into Walmart on the back of Dominic the Italian Christmas donkey, accompanied by a mariachi band playing "Feliz Navidad." No, wait, that's not it - - - how about Mary and Joseph riding into town on a Harley, to the tune of Mariah Carey (remember her?) bellowing "All I Want for Christmas is You!" No, that's not it either - - - how about a quiet candlelight service on Christmas Eve, with your favorite Christmas carols and readings? I definitely prefer Option 3, and I hope you will join us that night to welcome the Christ Child quietly and reverently. It wasn't so many years ago that we had to set up folding chairs to accommodate all the worshippers on Christmas Eve; let's see how many pews we can fill this year!

Congratulations to Nathan Shriner, who will take Holy Communion for the first time on December 10. Nathan has been preparing with Pastor Joe for the past few weeks, and is eagerly looking forward to this next step in his religious growth.

On January 28 we will hold our annual congregation meeting after the worship service. It should be fairly brief: mostly we need to elect Congregation Council members and approve the 2024 budget. Please plan on staying after church for the meeting; please also consider becoming a member of the council (even if you have served on the council before!) It doesn't take a lot of time, and it's an opportunity to serve Elias. Please speak to any current council member if you would like to take part in the adventure.
